This distinctive home on 65 acres offers an atmosphere of western living at its finest. The foyer is open and spacious offering a sitting area and a custom log wet bar. The massive floor to ceiling two sided rock fireplace is designed for ambiance and efficient output of heat. The great room has a wall of windows that frame the dramatic Clarks Fork Canyon and Beartooth Mountains. The ceiling reaching nearly 2 stories in the great room contains massive log beams. Off the great room is a large deck. Hardwood floors are throughout the home with tile floors in the bathrooms.

The kitchen is a chef's delight with a large island for food preparation. Cabinets are distressed Alder and counters are granite. The stainless steel appliances include a double oven, built in microwave, dishwasher and side by side refrigerator. There are pullouts in all the lower cabinets. There is breakfast nook area next to the wall of windows in the kitchen.

The master suite has two sitting areas and a door to the deck on the west side of the home. The generous master bath has 18 inch tile floor, two walk in closets, double sinks with granite counter, Jacuzzi tub and a walk in tiled shower with three shower heads.

In another wing of the home, there is a half bath, laundry and large walk in pantry. There are two guest bedrooms wired for internet and computers. The guest bath between the bedrooms has double sinks with granite counter top, Jacuzzi tub with a tiled shower and log accents. Both have vaulted ceilings and recessed lighting. The office/computer room has tile floors.

The home has forced air heat with 2 furnaces and central air conditioning. Off of the two car attached garage is a workshop with a full bathroom and kitchen area. This area could easily be used as a guest quarters, mother-in-law quarters or maid quarters. Including this finished shop area there is a total of 3590 square feet in this home.

The yard is beautifully landscaped and has a four zone drip system. The Trex deck that wraps around the west side of the home has electric and gas for a barbeque.

The 65 acres borders BLM that connects with National Forest. The mountain views are incredible. The Clarks Fork of the Yellowstone River flows out of the Canyon only five minutes from this property. There is abundant wildlife in the area. Situated in the community of Clark, 30 miles north of Cody, Wyoming, it is an easy scenic drive to Yellowstone National Park and the Beartooth Highway.





Clarks Fork worthy of new attention

ainbow trout were moving laterally across the L Ucurrent, gulping cripples and emergers. Not one, two or three trout at a time. but dozens of them.

They looked to be about 14 -15 inches long as they worked systematically through the long run. Occasionally, a large splash was heard in the deeper water as a much larger trout porpoised to take a rising insect.

The day was warm and overcast and the time was midmorning in the middle of September. The reason for the trout activity was a stupendous hatch of Tricorythodes, better known among fly fishers as Tricos, and even better known as the "white-winged curse."

No matter, the trout could have cared less about the name of the tiny black mayfly. All that concerned them was the sheer number and volume of calories floating downriver. Everywhere one looked, the water was alive with rising. splashing, or smutting fish.

This occurrence was not on the Bighorn River in Montana, where huge pods of smutting trout can be found feeding on Tricos every year, but in a river in Wyoming that most anglers have written off

as a wild trout fishery since the mid-1980s. Where there was once a good population of big rainbows, browns and native Yellowstone cutthroat, by the late '90s the catch was typically comprised of whitefish - and plenty of them.

There weren't thousands upon thousands of trout feeding like they can do on the Bighorn River, but there were enough to show the river might be recovering.

The river is rich with midges, caddis, mayfly and stonefly populations, despite a drought and continual draw down on river flows by irrigation. This river is the lower Clarks Fork of the Yellowstone.

Catches of big trout have been going up the past few years. Why? Who knows. The better question is this: Has the Clarks Fork returned as a viable wild trout fishery? I think it could be on its way. Based on the time friends and I have spent fishing there since 2000, the recording of large brown and rainbow trout has tripled.

Even the Yellowstone cutthroat caught have fewer clipped fins, indicating this native trout also could be on the rebound. Age classes of rainbows and cutthroat run the gamut from fry to juveniles to adults, something new for a change.

Trout numbers seen rising to hatches are on the increase from inside the canyon and all the way to the Montana state line. Am I excited? You bet. This river has the ingredients to rival the North Fork as a

big wild trout river.

Managing for harvest numbers has become Neanderthalic in other Western states' management plans or flowing waters. Lakes are a different story and should no be compared with a river or stream where natural reproduction can take place.

Changing the way anglers fish a wild trout fishery is dif ficult, due to prejudices and rankled cries of "elitism," but the fact is, folks, the times changed a long time ago. Three decades ago, sadly. Wyoming needs to step in

the 21st century. If Arkansas has seen the light regarding wild trout versus stocked on their trout fisheries, so can Wyoming. After all, Wyoming ranks 38th on the scale of technology, industry and eco nomic growth, while Arkans sits at the bottom at 50th.

I believe the Clarks Fork worth the effort.

CLARK, WYOMING, where the grandeur of the rugged Beartooth Mountains loom majestically over the sage covered prairie is situated 30 miles north of Cody. The Clarks Fork of the Yellowstone River, Wyoming's only federally designated 'wild and scenic river' flows out of the Clarks Fork Canyon and meanders through the valley. The Clarks Fork Canyon is the division between the Beartooth Mountains to the north and the Absaroka Mountains to the south. Looking west when you turn into Clark, from the Canyon south, the mountains you see are Bald Peak, Bald Ridge, Trout Peak, Pat O'Hara and Heart Mountain. There are 3 drainages to the north of the canyon, Little Rock Creek, Bennett Creek and Line Creek.

Clark's legal boundaries encompasses approximately 193 square miles. The boundary begins just north of County Road 7RP on Chapman Bench (Hwy.120) and goes north to the Montana state line, west to the Shoshone National Forest and east to include some of the arid lands in Badger Basin. The first Clark post office was established in 1891 and the first school was established in 1895. There are approximately 300-350 residents in the Clark valley today. There is no longer a post office. Mail comes through the Powell post office.

There are 3 accesses to the Shoshone National Forest, the Clarks Fork Canyon being the most spectacular. From the mouth of the Canyon you can horseback ride, hike or 4-wheel drive five miles along the river with towering mountain walls on either side. At the end of the canyon, the trail on the north side switchbacks to the top of the Beartooth Mountains and goes over to Highway 212. This is the Morrison Jeep Trail.

Looking across the river on the south face of the canyon, the steep trail that Chief Joseph and the Nez Perce Indians took on their escape from Yellowstone Park in 1877 can be faintly seen. Colonel Sturgis had been waiting at the mouth of the Canyon. He was told by scouts that there was no way that the Nez Perce could escape through this canyon and he moved his company south to Heart Mountain. The Nez Perce accomplished an amazing fete, and 700 people and 2000 horses escaped through this canyon and headed north.

A year later in 1878, the Bannock Indian conflict took place on the Clarks Fork River. During the early morning battle, among the dead were Captain Andrew Bennett and Little Rock, a Crow interpreter. Bennett Creek, Bennett Buttes and Bennett Buttes Cemetery are named in honor of Captain Bennett. Little Rock Creek was named after the Crow interpreter.

The Clarks Fork Recreation Center hosts community activities including an annual rodeo. Clark is within the Powell School District with an elementary school of Kindergarten through fifth grade and a student population averaging 30-35 students total.
